Problems to access appointments to interviews, huge delays due to supposed covid situation, but in fact due to a bad organisation. Due to delays, asylum seekers access late to certain rights as the access to labour market. There is a very bad quality of interviews held by police officers in the regions (interviews held by police officers not the central administration), sometimes there is no strict guarantee of confidentiality. There is no follow-up of those interviews by the "instructors" in the OAR, so the asylum application sometines are just a resume in one page of an interview that has taken few hours. No guarantee that persons were accompanied by a lawyer at first instance even if under the Spanish law it might be possible but the administration prevent to have legal assitance during interviews.
